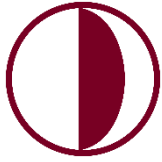

1. Preparing the environment: Ensuring that all necessary supplies are ready and clean, and that the temperature is appropriate and the setting is comfortable.	1	
2. Checking the patient's medical record for medication allergies.	2	
3. Hand washing / hand hygiene	0.5	
4. Verifying the patient's identity and obtaining consent.	1	
5. Checking the medication chart.	1.5	
6. Checking the medication (correct medication, correct dose, expiration date).	2	
7. Positioning the patient appropriately (sitting position, head upright).	1	
8. Communicating with the patient, explaining the medication and the process.	0.5	
9. Checking the inside of the mouth.	2	
10. Administering the medication to the patient using the correct technique (tablet, capsule, liquid).	2	
11. If the medication is a tablet, capsule, pill, or certain liquid medications, ensuring a glass is used and the medication is swallowed with sufficient water.	2	
12. Observing whether the patient has taken the medication.	2	
13. Collecting the used materials and cleaning the area.	0.5	
14. Documenting the procedures.	2

• **Question Pool 1**

1. Why are medications administered? List two reasons.
2. What is a side effect? Define it.
3. What is a contraindication? Define it.
4. What is an antiemetic? Define it.
5. Give two examples of solid dosage forms.
6. List two responsibilities of nurses in medication administration.
7. What should the position be when administering medication into the ear for children and infants up to three years of age?
8. What position should be used when administering medication rectally?
9. In which situations should oral medication not be administered?

• **Question Pool 2**

1. From which sources are medications obtained?
2. What is drug tolerance? Define it.
3. What is bioavailability? Define it.
4. List the rates of drug absorption from fastest to slowest.
5. Ten principles must be followed when administering medications. List these principles in order.
6. What is a package insert? Define it.
7. If tachycardia develops in a patient while administering medication via a nebulizer, what should you do first?
8. If 1 cc equals 1 ml, how many deciliters does 1 ml equal?
